In October, BGN saw the return of school trips out to the wider world with the Sixth Form visit to see a performance of '*Romeo and Juliet*' by the Royal Shakespeare Company at the world famous Globe Theatre. Today's Globe is a faithful reconstruction of the original Elizabethan playhouse for which William Shakespeare wrote his plays. It is open to the elements so we were all pleased and relieved when the forecast for the day was mild and sunny.


Having caught the train down to Marylebone, we took the tube across London to Camden, picking up



a quick bite to eat from Camden Market, and then taking advantage of the good weather to walk the rest of the way, past Trafalgar Square and Nelson's Column, down Whitehall, pausing at the Cenotaph and Downing Street, before finishing with a hasty walk along the Thames to the theatre.

The trip was an important part of the students' course as it complimented their study of Elizabethan theatre and the performance conditions of the day. The play also linked to the Year 13 study of '*Theatre in Education*' as it focused on the mental health of young people.

It was liberating to be out and about in the vibrant hustle and bustle of London, but the real highlight of the day was the wonderful performance at the Globe, featuring a diverse and youthful cast. It was an invaluable opportunity to experience live performance again, as well as benefitting the students' A Level knowledge.


Thank you also to the Year 8s who carried on selling the cakes during the second break and to all the staff who supported us too by buying and eating them!
