

Enterprising scientists have set-up a Medical Society where they give presentations on Science topics. The aim is to enhance presentation and interview skills in readiness for university interviews.



On the first day we participated in lots of fun games which helped to develop our team building skills. We especially liked the escape room! In the evening we had a session getting to


know each other and ourselves better.

The Mass was inclusive, enjoyable and was a very


good way to end our third day in our first religious retreat.



Ali for this challenge.



### Blood Brothers—a tragic musical!

Last term, we were fortunate to obtain tickets to see a production of Willy Russell's Blood Brothers at the Oxford Playhouse. Blood Brothers is a text we study for GCSE Literature and it was a great opportunity to be able to take some Year 11 pupils to see a matinee performance of this play.

It certainly didn't disappoint – it was captivating from start to finish and we all went home with the songs in our heads for quite a time.

Year 11 benefitted enormously from seeing the play; it brought it to life and gave pupils a much deeper understanding of characters and important themes.

The play 'Blood Brothers' by Willy Russell is set in Liverpool in the early 1980s. It follows the lives of two twins, who are separated at birth, and are raised by two different families: one household in poverty and the other from a wealthy background. Despite the two families' best efforts to keep the twins away from one another, they meet up throughout their lives, which ultimately leads to their demise.

The theatre conducting the musical was able to capture the very basis of the play through the use of its lighting to create an ominous, eerie setting, as well as using visual effects to provide a realistic experience for the audience.

The cast chosen to perform 'Blood Brothers' was more than exceptional to play out this tragedy; as a matter of fact they were outstanding. Each actor was able to captivate the audience through their voices, whether whilst singing, or how they imitated a Liverpudlian accent perfectly. In addition, the way they enacted the play enabled them to fully encompass the essence of each and every character in order to make this play a truly remarkable one.

In my opinion the trip as a whole was a stunning experience. I personally found the musical elements of the play the most incredible. This is because the musicians were able to create a perfect atmosphere for when there was either tension or joy. Likewise, the voices of each actor were almost unbelievable. Hearing their vocals echoing throughout the entire theatre during a song made the whole experience feel almost surreal. It was as though you were being taken on a spectacular journey. Another part which I particularly enjoyed, and which I am sure many of the audience would agree with, was the effects that the show used, especially during the ending sequence, where we were left at the edge of our



seats, waiting in anticipation for what was about to occur when, suddenly, 'BANG!' two guns went off, with smoke filling the air. This made the scene feel wonderfully realistic, and made many people in the audience, including myself, jump from being startled.


#### Friends of BGN

### Bishop Stephen—always getting it Wright!



What a huge honour it was to be invited to St Chad's Cathedral on Friday 17 November for a Mass of thanksgiving for the work of Bishop Stephen in the Birmingham Diocese.

Bishop Stephen served as Parish Priest in St Joseph's, Banbury and was also our school Chaplain at BGN. He fully immersed himself in our school life, becoming a treasured member of our school community. He was only with us from 2003-2007, but he is still remembered fondly within the community. He travelled on Diocesan pilgrimage to Lourdes with us and gave a sermon at one of the Diocesan-led Masses that week.

I distinctly remember people commenting after the Mass that he would become a Bishop one day—and how 'Wright' they were! We continued to have contact with Bishop Stephen as his appointment to serve in one of the parishes in Burton-upon-Trent meant that Miss Smith was able to continue to be a great friend to him after he left Banbury. Indeed it was Bishop Stephen who led the Requiem Mass for Miss Smith last year.

Our current Year 13s met Bishop Stephen in Lourdes last year and were instantly taken by his manner and nature in the sermons that he gave and, as such, they were excited to be part of his Mass of thanksgiving. Those present at the Mass consisted of schools and parishes where Bishop Stephen had served and all were overjoyed to be part of the event. Bishop Stephen took the time to come and talk to our BGN students and he was so appreciative of our presence at the Mass. Our students were a credit to the school and a member of the congregation commented on how smart and well-behaved they were. He shared that it was whilst in Lourdes that he learnt he was appointed to the Diocese of Hexham and Newcastle. His sermon was once again memorable as he contemplated the lives of Northern Saints and, in particular, St Cuthbert and finished with his line 'eee it's a long way back'!




#### **Attendance and punctuality**

Punctuality and good attendance are essential if students are to benefit fully from their education. All students are expected to attend for more than 96% of each school year. This is the national expectation for all students, as research shows that anything less than this will mean students miss out on more than 10 days of school in an academic year and will more than likely drop a grade in their achievement each year that this happens. If a student's attendance is less than 90%, they will be classed as a 'persistent absentee' by Ofsted and the Department for Education.

#### **Punctuality**

At BGN we expect all students to arrive in school on time as lack of punctuality affects learning and behaviour not only of the pupil who is late, but it has an impact on all other learners as the teacher is required to recap on missed lesson content for those who arrive late.

Punctuality is also a key workplace skill which must be learnt at school. Employees who are regularly late to work lose their jobs. In the work place you cannot arrive at the start time, you must be in the work place prior to the start time and ready at your desk or workstation for the official start



time. Students should be in form by 8.40 am **NOT** arriving through the gates at this time.

At the end of the last academic year, we held a raffle for each year group for excellent attendance. These included students who had above 96% attendance.


