Year 9 Modern Languages trip to Oxford University

On 29 February 2024, we had the privilege of being invited to a Modern Foreign Languages day at The Queen's College, Oxford, part of Oxford University. This gave us a wonderful opportunity to indulge in a variety of languages and activities.

First was a workshop on subtitling a short film. This was about using past knowledge and new vocabulary to create descriptions for such a film. There were workshops in French, German and Spanish – ours was in French.

This was followed by an invitation to a presentation about why we should study languages. In this presentation we learnt about how significant Modern Foreign Languages are for our future career paths. We then had an activity which was learning a new language in thirty minutes. We learned some Brazilian Portuguese. The lecturer began by talking to us about the widespread array of countries where Portuguese is spoken, then we practised pronouncing certain letters and words. We were also invited to learn Norwegian in thirty minutes. Firstly, we were taught the cultures and the two types of Norwegian language. Later on, we were taught how to say our names, goodbye and thank you: *'Jeg heter Bethy'*.

One of the final activities was a short presentation on the intriguing application of language studies that is linguistics. We were given a brief explanation of the field and the presenter was very informative and concise, and also very clear. We really enjoyed it.

Language Leaders

Language Leaders is a programme for Year 10 students. In this programme the pupils who sign up create three lessons of different languages in groups. They are assessed on these lessons by their teacher and given feedback. After completing all three lessons the students are awarded a certificate, along with a badge.

This year we have three groups: a Spanish group which consists of four students; a French group which has three students; and finally a Polish group with two students.

For the first lesson the students presented to their fellow Language Leaders. All the groups completed their first lesson successfully and received positive feedback. Hopefully, by the end of March 2024 they will have made their first trip to a primary school and taught the lesson they have prepared to a small group of children.

Language Leaders is an enjoyable experience centred around fostering leadership skills. Through this programme we have been given the opportunity to develop our leadership skills and cultivate essential qualities like communication, collaboration and making decisions.

Language Leaders provides a platform for personal growth and development. It is truly a rewarding experience and I am grateful that I have been given this opportunity.

It was amazing to see one of our Year 13 students on *BBC Question Time* in January this year; you may also have read about her in the Banbury Guardian and the Oxford Mail, or heard her on BBC Radio Oxford!

Zainab joined our Sixth Form in 2023 as a Year 12 student and has continually impressed us with her commitment to being an ambassador for youth voice. Last year she undertook work experience with Victoria Prentice and was able to see parliamentary processes from the inside. Her political interests and enthusiasm did not stop there. She was invited to appear on Question Time when it was filmed in Oxford in January and her question focussed on challenging the panel members in their appeal to undecided young voters.



Zainab is also a Youth Ambassador for the Duke of Edinburgh Award which she credits with enabling young people from diverse backgrounds, like her own, to experience opportunities which would otherwise not be available to them. She has also just been invited to Buckingham Palace in May as an Ambassador for the DoFE Award. When she was 16, Zainab found out that she needed major heart surgery which, now she is fully recovered, has led to her being asked to become an Ambassador for the British Heart Foundation. In February half-term she was asked by the Department of Education to meet with the Secretary of State, Gillian Keegan, to discuss the government policy for young people, and the priorities for funding if they win the election. After her A Levels this summer, she plans to take a gap year and is aiming to secure an internship with the Adam Smith Institute, researching within government policy. Following this, she is aiming for university to study History and Politics.

Zainab is a role model to our students, a true ambassador for youth citizenship and student voice. We are very proud of her.

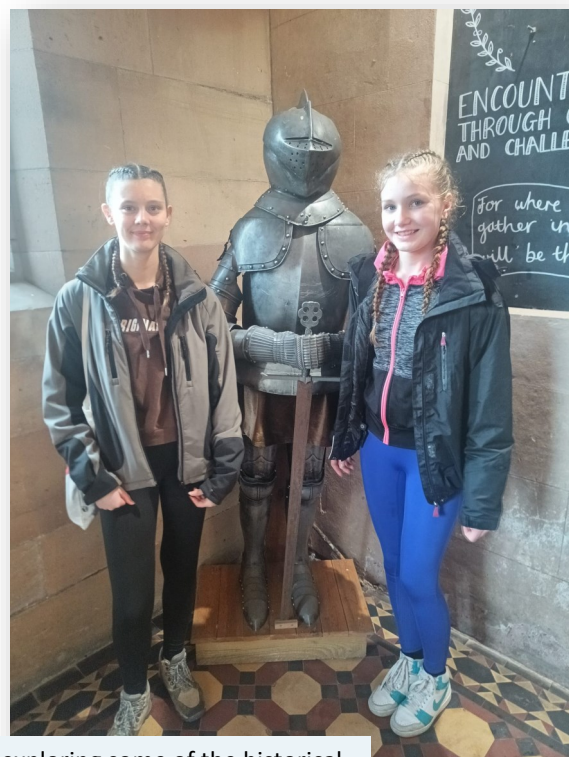

work with young people in schools to develop confidence and leadership skills, enabling them to deliver physical activity sessions for less active students in schools. The overall aim is for the pupils to run fun and engaging sessions within schools to make sure that everyone enjoys it so much they come back next time with their friends!

The coach academy programme is split into four stages:-

- Stage 1** *Online training.* Three sessions delivered virtually to a small group of students in each nominated school.
- Stage 2** *Delivery.* The trained leaders will lead a minimum of four physical activity sessions in their school aimed at less active students.
- Stage 3** *Evaluation.* All leaders, participants and school staff complete an insight survey to track the success of the sessions.
- Stage 4** *Future impact.* We will have a face-to-face training day, bringing all the girls together to plan how they build on the skills they have developed to help others. This includes formal First Aid training.

This is a fantastic achievement – Well done to everyone!

British Society for Gene and Cell Therapy, Oxford

British Society for
Gene and Cell Therapy

On Tuesday 19 March 24 Year 12 A Level Biology students attended the 'British Society for Gene and Cell Therapy' Symposium held at the Oxford University Natural History Museum. The students had the opportunity to learn about cutting edge research on gene and stem cell therapy in a variety of conditions, including cystic fibrosis and spinal muscular atrophy. Students learned about gene delivery viral vectors and the use of CRISPR in gene editing. It was wonderful to hear from a young lady who had leukaemia and had recently been successfully treated with CAR T-cells; this treatment had saved her life. The students then had an opportunity to peruse the Museum displays and activities including making 3D models of DNA, getting temporary tattoos of DNA and viral vectors, practising DNA complementary base pairing through making DNA bracelets and having a virtual reality look at a gene therapy laboratory. They also talked with scientists and clinicians from a range of backgrounds. The day had excellent links to the AQA A Level Biology specification, including the application of immunity, stem cells, virus structure, genetic modification and gene therapy.

The Year 12 Biologists found the experience interesting and educational, helping them to consider the career options that are available after degree level. The day consisted of five speakers who came from a range of professional backgrounds, followed by a panel Q&A session and online opinion poll. Students gained experience about the ethics of research, the scientific community, how it is funded, and the aims of many different researchers to cure disease. Students also enjoyed the opportunity to speak with PhD students, post-doctoral researchers and professors to gain a better understanding of life as a research scientist or clinician.

Prolonged illness

Unless requested, we do not normally need to see medical evidence for absences for illness. However, if your child is away from school for an illness which means they miss school for five or more days, we do require medical evidence such as a doctor's appointment card. Should your child have prolonged periods of time absent due to ongoing illness, a letter from the doctor is required stating clearly that the student is unfit for school.
